41 New Law Enforcement Explorers Graduate from Academy 13-20

A tradition of excellence continues as 41 Explorer Recruits completed the 20th Law Enforcement Explorer Academy #13-20. Sponsored by Phoenix Police Explorer Post 2906, eight Arizona law enforcement agencies sent recruits to the 2 week-100 hour course June 3-14, held at the Arizona Law Enforcement Academy South Mountain campus.



All classes were taught by veteran law enforcement professionals from Phoenix Police, on more than a dozen topics, ranging from ethics to

criminal law and traffic control, to report writing, including armory/range experience. Each day began with a 0530 show time followed by PC (physical conditioning), and even in the summer weather, the recruits met the challenge of the obstacle course, especially enjoying ESB's SGT Jeff Benza and LT Kimberly Mitchell joining them on their runs. RTOs challenging the Recruits were: Officers E. Miller, D. Garcia and L. Ruelas.

Thirteen Recruits from Post 2906 gained full Explorer status:

Scarlett Alliger, Acacia Anaya, Jorge Castro, Mersadez DeAnda-Sanchez, Amethyst Dennison, Marissa Dowhan, Michael Gonzalez, Orlando Gonzalez, Socorro Nieves, John Smokoska, Rebekah Torres, Carsen Vaughn and Analee Zavala. Class awards for best physical conditioning were won by Post 2906 Explorers Acacia Anaya (female) and Orlando Gonzalez (male).

Explorer M. Gonzalez noted that the SAU training by Officer L. Wood was #1 in his 2 week experience, enjoying the challenge of the class and the humor of the instructor. Explorer A. Anaya stated that the Traffic Law and Control courses were top of her list; "It was interesting to learn specific things that could be ticketed on the street and the basics of the law. I had so much fun doing traffic control. . . it was an awesome experience being the one in control in the middle of an intersection!" PC award winner Anaya notes she "stressed over the final PC test and inspection", and said she "became closer friends with my fellow Explorers because we were there for each other and we still are."

Graduate Explorer **M. Dowhan** identified the POPAT Training as important to her, saying "I learned more of my strengths and weaknesses through it." Noting that her standards for herself

were "way higher" at graduation, **Dowhan** said she learned how to "push my limits" and "made so many close friends within the Post and outside the Post that I still talk to."

Explorer **R. Torres** echoed **M. Gonzalez** in choosing SAU as an interesting class module, noting she learned that females can also be members of a SWAT team. **Torres'** favorite activity was Patrol for the "experience of what it is like to work as a patrol officer." She notes that her Post 2906 friends were "brought closer and I made friends from other Posts."

Explorer J. Smokoska shared: "My first thoughts when I first saw myself in my Class As were: 'I made it and that I actually accomplished something! You can't just walk into the academy and get a uniform. You have to earn it through hard work and dedication. Most importantly you have to have Integrity Honor and Pride." Many Recruits agreed with Explorer S. Nieves that the first day of the Academy was "unbelievably scary", but said she attended each day "with all the enthusiasm in the world". "Seeing everyone in their Class A uniforms at graduation made just one thought come to mind. . .'We did it!' " Nieves gives a great summation of the Academy experience: "Success comes in three words: Hardwork, Determination and then your biggest prize of all is VICTORY!"
