
Spring is in the Air and Weeds Begin to Flare!

With our unseasonably warm winter this year, weeds are cropping up early in Phoenix. Weeds grow quickly in the springtime and are not only unsightly, but can aggravate allergies and harbor insects and rodents. When high weeds like tumbleweeds become dry, they can also create a fire hazard. Allowing the growth of weeds



negatively impacts neighborhoods and if allowed to exceed six inches, they become a Phoenix city code violation.

Owners and occupants of properties in Phoenix are required to keep weeds cut to below six inches in height and remove dead and dry vegetation on all yards and along the adjacent right of ways. The area to keep free of high weeds includes from the property line to the curb and the midpoint of the alley where applicable.



Phoenix residents are encouraged to join efforts to fight blight and keep our neighborhoods free of excessive weed growth.

Preventative measures such as mechanical pulling of weeds when they first appear or applying pre- and postemergent herbicides can significantly reduce

weed issues on your property. It is also important to make arrangements to have someone maintain your yard if you plan to be out of town for an extended period of time.

Additionally, if you are aware of a neighbor who has difficulty maintaining their yard, offer to lend a helping hand. A small act of kindness can go a long way in preserving the environmental health of your neighborhood.

You can make a significant difference in maintaining a healthy and safe environment in your neighborhood. Keep Phoenix clean and beautiful for all to enjoy!

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance

Each tax season, the city of Phoenix's Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) campaign helps working families with free tax preparation and filing services. Preparation and filing assistance for families who earned less than \$54,000 in 2017 is now available.

Seventeen primary sites, located in Phoenix, are offering free tax preparation and filing services from Monday, January 20 through Tuesday, April 17, including Saturdays. A list of Phoenix sites, with hours and days of operation, is available at phoenix.gov/eitc. It is important to note that hours and days of operation vary for different locations.

Individuals and families may qualify and file for the child tax credit, dependent care credit, education tax credit and EITC up to \$6,318 at the city's free tax preparation sites.

Love Your Block Supports Resident Projects

Love Your Block (LYB) is funding nine grassroots projects with \$1,000 grants in Phoenix.

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LYB supports resident-led community revitalization projects that connect residents with city leaders and brings them together to bring about positive change in neighborhoods. AmeriCorps VISTA members, Talia Ramella and Lenny Gross manage the program, which has expanded citywide this year.

As a capacity building exercise, LYB mobilizes neighborhoods behind common goals and sets the stage for future community revitalization projects. Central to the program is the spirit of equipping residents with tools and resources to lead the change they wish to see in their communities.

This year's projects include an Alley Activation in South Phoenix. The Women's Support Group of South Phoenix, a newly formed neighborhood association, will become stewards of an alleyway adjacent to the community center in which they all meet. By taking ownership over the thoroughfare, they will create a safe walking space for the neighborhood



and set the stage for future grassroots projects.

The Grant Park community garden, located in the Grant Park neighborhood just south of the Warehouse District, is another great LYB project. Neighborhood volunteers will create straw bale gardens. These unique raised garden beds are more environmentally sustainable than traditional raised beds, harbor

nutrients necessary to plant growth, and are easily movable. These garden beds will be adopted by Grant Park neighbors and used to grow seasonal vegetables.

Other LYB projects range from tree plantings, community murals, and lot activations. If you have a community revitalization idea of your own, keep an eye out on phoenix.gov/volunteer for the 2018-2019 grant cycle.

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Infill project breaks ground on two new builds in Garfield

The City of Phoenix Neighborhood Services Department (NSD) received approval to construct two quality and energy-efficient affordable single-family homes for homeownership in the Garfield community.

The two new home sites located at 702 North 11th Street are part of the Redevelopment Area adjacent to Downtown Phoenix.

NSD has teamed up with Trellis, a non-profit dedicated to making stable homes and communities possible by educating, building and lending, through a Request for Proposal and was awarded the contract to construct the new infill homes.

Trellis designed two, 3-Bedroom, 2-Bath homes that are Silver-rated, EnergyStar, Indoor Air Quality Plus-V3 with HERS index scores of 53-57. They are fully accessible and conserve water, reduce utility demand and maintenance costs and foster a healthy living environment.

Furthermore, the designs are compatible with historic building patterns of the neighborhood in scale, type and setback and include historical architectural features common to the Garfield neighborhood.

Did you know that City of Phoenix offers graffiti removal paint and supplies to residents interested in abating graffiti on their own property and/or neighborhood? Simply contact the Graffiti Program and speak to a staff person about the needed paint and supplies. A field employee will assess the area(s) to identify the paint color and amount needed. Once this has been determined, the resident can either pick up the order or have it delivered to their home. #GraffitiFreePHX



Did you know that the Graffiti Busters Program uses a computerized color matching system to color match paint? Graffiti crews already carry various colors of paint on their paint trucks. However, when they come across a different color, they can simply scan that color and make the paint. The paint is used to cover over the graffiti and the remainder left with the property owner to remove future tags on their property.

Simply contact the Graffiti Busters Program and speak to a staff person about the needed paint and supplies. A field employee will assess the area(s) to identify the paint color and amount needed.
